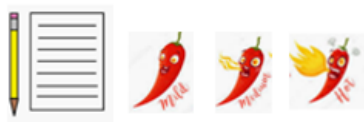

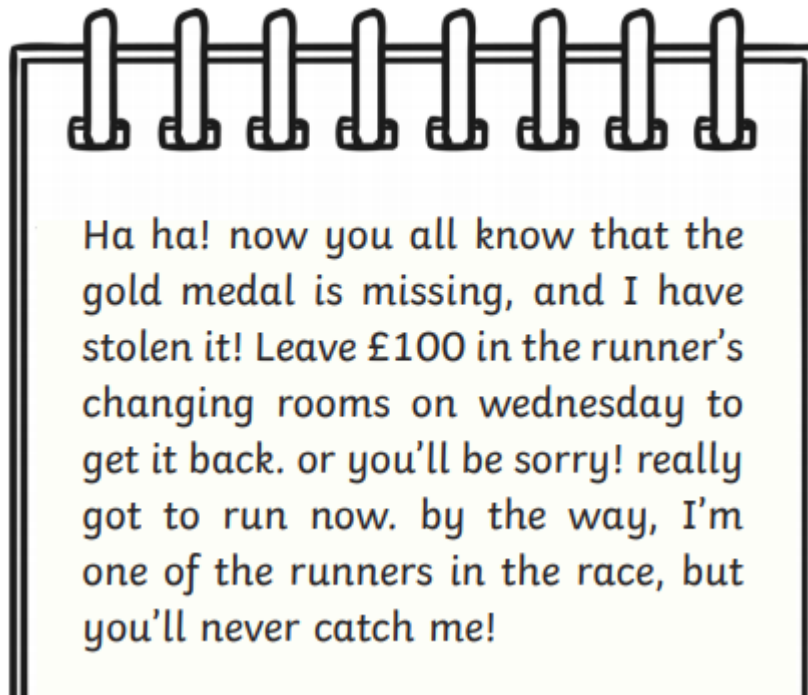

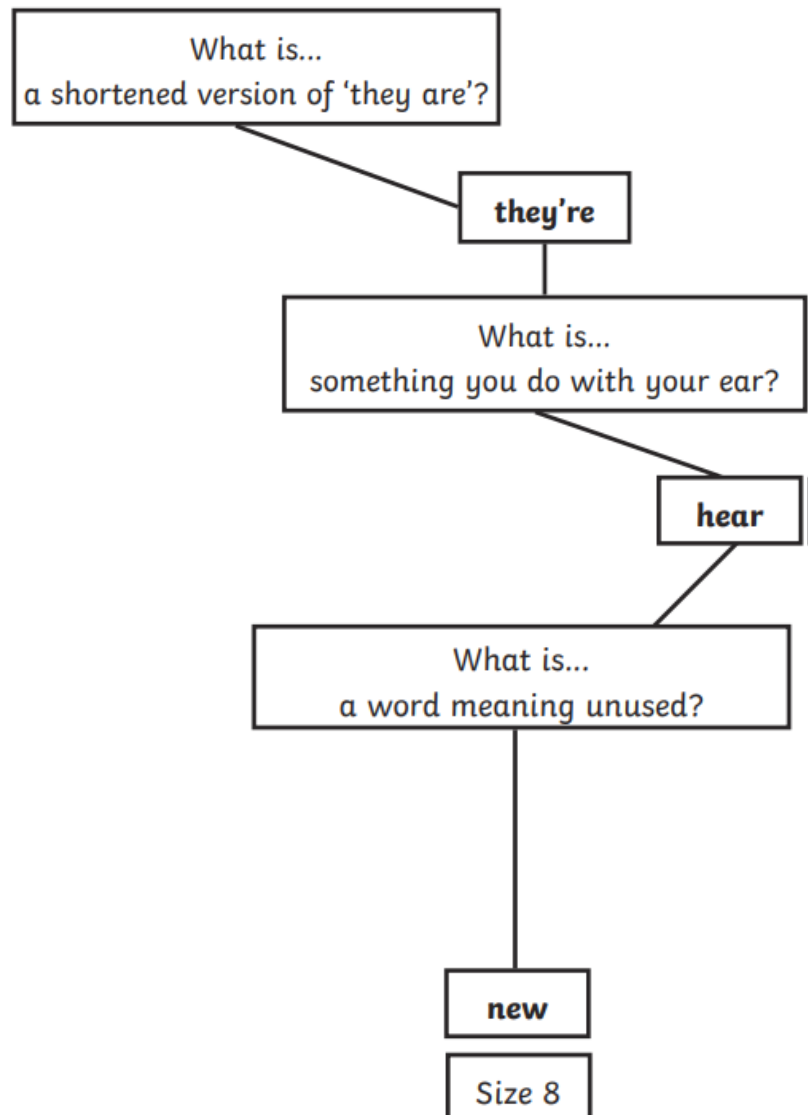
Clue 2 – A Lucky Card Clue

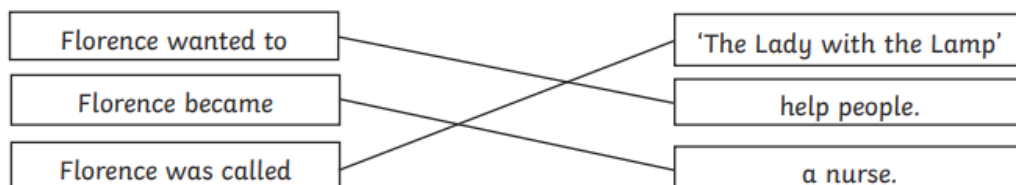
