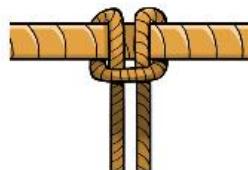

She thought that men and women should be treated equally, black or white, and she showed everyone that a black woman could do what anyone else does just as well.

Pupil's own responses, such as: No, I do not think Dorothy's experience of overcoming inequality is unique because the suffrage campaigns also battled gender inequality to gain the vote for women in the UK.
