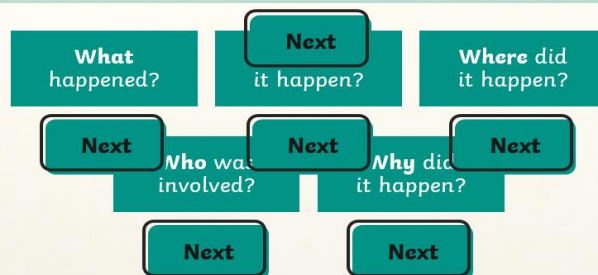

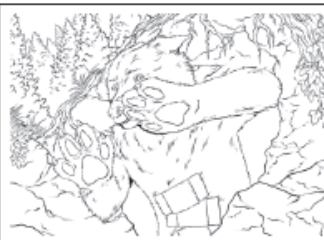

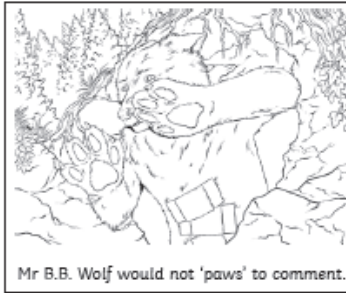

Using alliteration/puns to write headlines

Alliteration

Alliteration is the stylistic device of using a series of words begin with the same consonant sound.

An example of alliteration:

Busy buzzing, the bee behaved beautifully.

Alliteration is a technique that gives sentences a little more description, humour and energy. Try playing around with alliterative words and phrases to make your words come alive.

Examples of headlines using alliteration:

Bears' brekkie blagged by blonde!

Boastful biscuit beaten by fast-thinking fox

“Giant not so jolly” jokes Jack

Pining Prince seeks sweetheart to fit footwear

“Eat an apple” suggests sneaky snake

Sleepy seamstress sends city into century long snooze.

A pun is another way a newspaper heading can be set out.

What are some examples of a pun?

The definition of a pun is a **joke making a play on words**. An example of pun is **saying that your calendar days are numbered**.

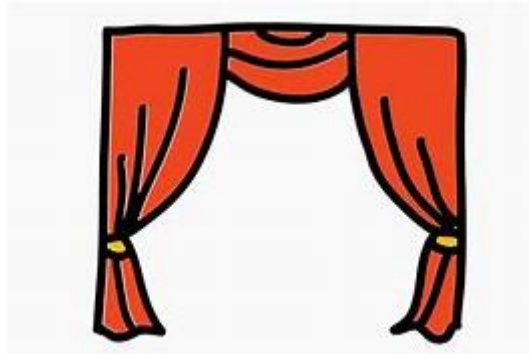
